Ron Harris '56 has served the last four years and played a major role in the GHHS auditorium renovation, getting the website http://grandviewheightsalumni.com online, upgrading the newsletter, starting the Legacy Society and basically being a real hard act to follow. I salute each and every one of these men and their board members for their hard work, dedication and love of Grandview Heights.

I am still in education administration and active in arts education initiatives. One son is a chef in Oregon and the other a scientist in South Carolina. I also have two fabulous grand girls.



Jean is the director of the multimonth outpatient chemical dependence program. In this capacity, she conducts family groups, lectures and interventions. She is also responsible for case management, HMO contracts, employee training and evaluation. In conjunction to her partnership in the McMillen Center, Jean serves as an adjunct faculty member of the Graduate School of Psychology of Antioch University in Los Angeles, California, where she teaches addiction studies classes. Jean has also served as adjunct faculty at Mission College of Sylmar, California and at Lindenwood University West.



Morgan Jones '45 was an American film and television actor. His acting credits of more than 170 roles in television include reoccurring appearances in *Highway Patrol* and *The Blue Angels*. His approximately twenty-five screen credits include a lead role in the 1957 science fiction film *Not of This Earth* by Roger Corman, *Apache Woman* in 1955, *Forbidden Planet* in 1956, *Fear Strikes Out* in 1957 and *Bells Are Ringing* in 1960.

In the 1945 GHHS Highlander

yearbook, Morgan bequeathed his bottle of hair tonic to Ross Green.

Born in Wooster,

Ohio, Morgan enlisted in the United States Navy after graduating GHHS. He was stationed at Naval Base Coronado and relocated to Hollywood to pursue acting after leaving the Navy. His first professional acting role was a small part in the 1952 musical *Singin' in the Rain*. Morgan Jones died in Tarzana, California, on January 13, 2012, at the age of 84. He is survived

by his son and granddaughter.

GHHSAA created the Distinguished **Alumnus Award** to recognize and honor those GHHS graduates, living or deceased, who have achieved extraordinary success in their chosen careers and fields of expertise. Those honored serve as great role models for current students.

Bobcat Inducted into Ohio Senior Olympics Hall of Fame

This past July, Sid Hall '53 was inducted into the Ohio Senior Olympics Hall of Fame in Cleveland, Ohio.

Since 1993, Hall has qualified for and competed in eight National Senior Olympics Games held in the cities of Baton Rouge (2), Tucson, Orlando, Norfolk, Pittsburgh, Louisville and Houston. Competing in swimming freestyle, breaststroke, and backstroke events, he has won 11 gold, 11 silver and 2 bronze medals while establishing five age-group records. His record in the 100 freestyle stood from 2001 to 2009.

In other national and international events starting in 1991, Hall has competed in the YMCA Master National Championships, the United States Masters (USMS) National Championships, and the World Masters Championships in freestyle, breaststroke and backstroke winning 19 gold, 33 silver and 20 bronze medals. In USMS age-group competitions, Hall has been ranked in the top ten in the nation in one or more events every year but one since 1991.

As a member of a championship 200 Meter Relay Team, Hall owned two world records. These occurred in the 1992 World Masters Swimming Championships

and the 1994 Great Lakes Zone Championships, both held in

the

Indianapolis at the IUPUI Natatorium.

In the State of Ohio Masters Championships, Hall has won 64 gold, 17 silver and 4 bronze medals. Hall's swimming career started during his Bobcat years when he was a two-time state champion and high school All-American swimmer. He picked up the sport again 37 years later at age 55 when motivated by a fellow church member to enter the Senior Olympics.

And he's not leaving the pool quite yet. Sid recently qualified in five events for the 2013 Senior Games. They are the 50, 100, 200, and 500 yard freestyle events and the 50 yard backstroke.

Since 1986 Hall has served The Ohio State University at Mansfield in several capacities including as a lecturer in accounting and finance and as Program Manager for the Fisher College of Business program during its formative years on the Mansfield, Ohio campus.

In addition to Hall's full calendar of athletic competitions, he has always found sufficient time to engage in many professional, civic and church related activi-

Then the radio show featured a guest, Martha Bayne, who had started the Chicago charity event "Soup and Bread". After hearing about Soup and Bread, Tricia flew to Chicago, where Megan now lives, so the sisters could attend and contribute together. And then Tricia decided to bring Soup and Bread home to Columbus.

Columbus Soup and Bread launched this past October and is held the first Tuesday of each month from 6-8pm at the Woodlands Tavern in Grandview, owned by Grandview graduates Jimmy Woodland '96 and Jason Woodland '98.

Guests mingle over a hot bowl of soup courtesy of professional and amateur cooks – musicians, bloggers, farmers, writers, restaurateurs, parents and friends – all with a pot to share. Diners contribute to the Mid-Ohio Food Bank in the Donation Crock Pot.

"I love this concept because you can't make soup for one," Tricia said. "And this is the perfect way to share with the community. When Ron opened it and began to read, he knew its value was priceless. The book has nearly all of B of R weekly meeting minutes from 1927 to 1931. Historic Brothers Ted Eaton, Herb Decker, Frank Higgs, W. Ed Bogen and many others are mentioned in the book.


Meeting notes included:

- Meetings called to order by Most High
- Ritual (most often dispensed with)
- · Roll call and call for dues
- Committee reports: Old business and New Business
- · Skunks brought up and returned
- Adjourn

Pages contained discussions of who to pledge, who was on probation, renting out the house for \$6 or more for Election Day, card parties, dances and expenses. Prices for food purchased on March 5, 1927 were:

2 lbs. sugar
9 lbs. ham

The most impressive of all the meeting notes was dated Jan. 6, 1929:

Three amendments were presented for vote. They after being passed three times are to be added to the Constitution. They are as follows:

 Brothers that are out for school teams go under the Skunks rules for training and receive the same penalty of swats for the violations of the foresaid rules

- Br Frantz, Br Bogen, Br Niple.

- 2. Skunk Swats
 - a. Smoking 1 swat from each Brother present and 1 Black mark
 - b. Drinking 2 swats from each Brother present and 2 Black marks
 - c. Grades -
 - 1. F's swat for each F over 2 F's inclusive. 12 F's 1 Black mark
 - 2. U's 5 swats for each U. 3 U's 1 Black mark.
- d. Gambling 10 swats for each time caught and 1 Black mark
- e. Failure to wear pin 2 swats each time. 3 times 1 Black mark
- f. 7 Black marks suspend Skunk. 2 after this puts them out
- g. Meetings missed unexcused 5 swats and 1 Black mark
- 3. Skunks must be passing in all subjects within the last 6 weeks of their pledge service and if not the Skunks are under suspension until this takes place.

Moved and seconded meeting adjourned.
