Auditorium Project Update

Phase 1 of the GHHS Auditorium Project is nearing completion. We painted the auditorium walls and replaced the sounddeadening panels with 20 new custom-made acoustical panels. We added a new sound system, which includes 3 large front-ofthe house speakers, 6 under balcony speakers, 4 above balcony speakers and 2 new subwoofers. There is a new electronic projection screen and a new ceiling mounted projector - a gift from an anonymous donor in memory of Stanton Jones. We completed a significant upgrade to the audio equipment in the sound room and behind the stage. Computer capabilities were also added. Teachers can now utilize the auditorium for teaching purposes. They began scheduling the auditorium for use early in 2010.

The old carpet was removed as was the existing tile floor. New carpet will be installed down all

aisles and in front of the stage at the end of January, which signals the completion of Phase 1. Now we focus on Phase 2 fundraising efforts. Phase 2 includes restoration of the auditorium chairs - refinishing of the wood back, the addition of a pad for the seatback, a new padded seat and painting of the metal frames. We will also build 2 platforms for handicapped seating. The final element of this phase is to build a new stagefront. This project could not have occurred without the generous support of the Alumni Association and their members. We offer our utmost thanks and invite everyone to consider sponsoring a chair. Bill Wall, former GHHS boys basketball coach, inducted into the National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame!

By Chris Oberholtz, The Kansas City Star Bill Wall, former GHHS boys basketball coach, was inducted into the National Collegiate

Basketball Hall of Fame Sunday evening, November 21, 2009 at the 2009 National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame Induction Celebration. Bill Wall had a plate full of basketball in 1975, not only as the head coach and director of athletics at MacMurray College in Illinois, but he was also the second executive director in the history of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He left both posts in that same year to accept the position of executive director of the Amateur Basketball Association of the United States of America (ABAUSA), a position he held for 18 years. During his tenure, Wall led a transition to have NBA players eligible for international competition and ABAUSA changed its name to USA Basketball. The first USA team of NBA players during Wall's tenure was the historic 1992 "Dream Team" that captured the gold medal at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics. The USA teams enjoyed tremendous success with Olympic gold medals in 1976, 1984 and 1992 for the USA men and 1984 and 1988 for the women. Wall, who has won numerous awards including the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame's John Bunn award (1994) and the FIBA Order of Merit (1994), was responsible for developing and administering foreign basketball team tours of the USA and USA team tours overseas. He also developed and administered international basketball coaching seminars for coaches and officials.

Wall taught Geography and Driver Education at GHHS from 1955-56, and coached varsity boys basketball, reserve football and golf. Congratulations Bill!

History of the Schools in Grandview Heights and Marble Cliff

As the 19th century came to a close, development was rapidly proceeding in the area of Columbus between the Olentangy and Scioto Rivers. This area, now known as Grandview Heights, Marble Cliff, and Upper Arlington included parts of three Franklin County townships. The area to the west, north of Fifth

log building served the area in Franklin Township on the corner of Grandview Avenue and Dublin Road. It was constructed around 1850 and was replaced by a brick building in 1872, according to former Marble Cliff resident and school board member P. S. Skeeles, speaking at the dedication of what is now known as Edison Elementary in 1912. He indicated in the



Harding School

Avenue, is Perry Township; to the northeast, Clinton Township; and south of Fifth Avenue is the northernmost portion of Franklin Township. With this new development came the need to educate the children of the families that were moving into this area. These new resident families had the responsibility of establishing the local school districts and building the schools. In the early days of the region there was a Perry Township school, called Fairview, on the northeast corner of Tremont and Lane Avenue. A Clinton Township school, nicknamed the "Polka Dot School" because of its equal racial mix, stood until about 1913 on Virginia Avenue south of Chambers Road, where it served families of the Sells Circus among others. Preceding this time, a one-room

same address that the school was called the Walcutt School, named for a prominent area family.

HARDING SCHOOL

In 1895 a new building was constructed on a site at the corner of Fairview and First Avenues. The school was called the Harding School and originally had two rooms on the south side.

It was expanded to four rooms sandwiching the tall central tower in 1898. The tower contained a large brass bell, which was melted and used in the war effort after the building was razed in 1930. (The entire building was sold as scrap for \$300.) In 1901, Marble Cliff legally incorporated as a village. After Grandview split away, the two communities maintained their own school districts until Marble Cliff dissolved their district in 1915. After a year under the Franklin Rural School District, the Marble Cliff schools were transferred by the Franklin County Board of Education to the Grandview Heights School District, where they have remained since.

In 1911, the need for additional facilities prompted the construction of the Grandview Elementary School (now Edison Elementary) for \$50,000. When it was completed, the Harding School became the High School, and the first class of seniors in the district (five girls and two boys) graduated in 1916. The elementary school had a 350 seat auditorium, which was used as a community movie theatre, showing "Paramount Moving Pictures" reels.


By 1917, even these facilities were inadequate. Enrollment in the district by this time had

grown to 529 students. High school enrollment alone had increased 446% in the five-year period from 1913, when there were 17 high school students. For the 1917/18 school year, grades one through three were located in the four room Broadview School (Fifth Avenue School,) near the corner of 5th and Broadview Avenue, grades four through eight in the elementary on Fairview, and the high school classes were in the Harding School. In addition to these students, Miss Mary Boyer privately schooled thirteen children from the district. Miss Boyer would later become one of Arlington's first elementary school teachers. She also conducted after-school foreign language classes for Grandview students, as well as for adult residents. Some parents chose to send their children to schools in the Columbus system, due to inadequate facilities and some necessary limitations to the breadth of the curriculum. In 1918 the district's first two principals, Mr. P.A. McCarty at the high school and Mrs. Ethel Layland at the elementary level were appointed.
