

1921 Theresa G. Folger Retires '1967

Theresa G. Folger - teacher, administrator, counsellor, community leader, a person of outstanding ability and sensitivity, a true leader in her profession - is the woman we honour as the spirit of Fairview.

Miss Folger began her educational career at old Fairview more than four decades ago. She had graduated from Steele High School in Dayton and from Denison University with the degree of Ph.B. Miss Folger is one of four girls in the Folger family, all Denison graduates. As a new teacher, Miss Folger taught many subjects, but her favorite was mathematics.

In 1924, Miss Folger was made assistant principal of Fairview, and thus gave up a great part of her classroom teaching. She has not, however, let this in any way disturb her close personal relationships with the students. She has been and is a leader in individual guidance of pupils and has given her valuable advice and direction to literally thousands of Fairview graduates. She has always kept abreast of modern trends and developments in education and has shared those which have merit with the faculty so that all could benefit from these advances.

Miss Folger, through her many educational achievements and community activities has been uniquely qualified to lead a school of the quality and reputation of Fairview, and to enhance its standing. Columbia University granted her a Master of Arts degree in administration and education in 1931. She has also been most active in the Dayton and Montgomery County Adult Education Association, president of the Ohio State Guidance Association, secretary of the Dayton and Montgomery County Mental Health Association, and president of the Womens' Education Association of Dayton, to name only a few of her professional interests.

Many curriculum changes have been initiated by Miss Folger - advanced chemistry and physics, advanced composition, and with Mr. Feuer, the independent study program.

Miss Folger, knowing the important role of parents and the home in the total concept of education, has led one of the most active and largest high school P.T.A.'s in the United States, and in other ways, such as Open House, has also brought the parents into close association with the school.

One could go on and on, but this is not a book, and it would take a large volume to relate all of Miss Folger's accomplishments.

Miss Folger - Fairview: Fairview - Miss Folger: it is difficult, indeed impossible, to separate them, so much has she given to herself to all at Fairview. Her personality, charm, wit, and understanding are intertwined not only in the past and present, but also the future of this school.

So, from the vast numbers of teachers, students, former teachers and students, and a host of friends, are offered thanks, appreciation, and gratitude for all past help and numberless good wishes for the future.

Miss Folger Ends Career After Forty-Six Years

Theresa G. Folger, after 46 wonderful years of teaching, has decided to turn in her books. The dynamic 97-pound principal is retiring at the end of this year.

Miss Folger graduated from the Steele High School, attended Denison University, and obtained her masters degree at Columbia University. She came to Fairview in 1921 as a teacher and within three years she was the assistant principal. Surprisingly though, Miss Folger did not always want to be a teacher. "I wanted to run a children's home, but social work required one more year of college. I had three sisters who were preparing for college and it would have cost my parents too much for all of us."

During World War II, Miss Folger received thousands of letters from boys overseas and answered them all. She remembers every student she has had. Asked how she felt when a class graduate, Miss Folger said, "You feel like you're losing the young people whom you're inter-

ested in, but on the other hand, you know they are going on to finer things."

During her career at Fairview, Miss Folger innovated many ideas and courses. A few new courses introduced since she has arrived are: plastics, advanced composition, art appreciation, Physics II and German IV. New programs have been College Night, Career Conference, and Spring Preview.

One humorous incident which Miss Folger recalls occurred when the faculty ate separately. There were two long tables in the dining room with men on one side and the women on the other.

"You know how men are at lunch," Miss Folger said. "The women arrived early one day and put the tables together and placed a flow-er arrangement in the middle. The men came in and had to sit with the women and it has been that way ever since."

Asked about some of the general educational highlights of her career, Miss Folger stated that the accelerated programs have helped students in prepar-

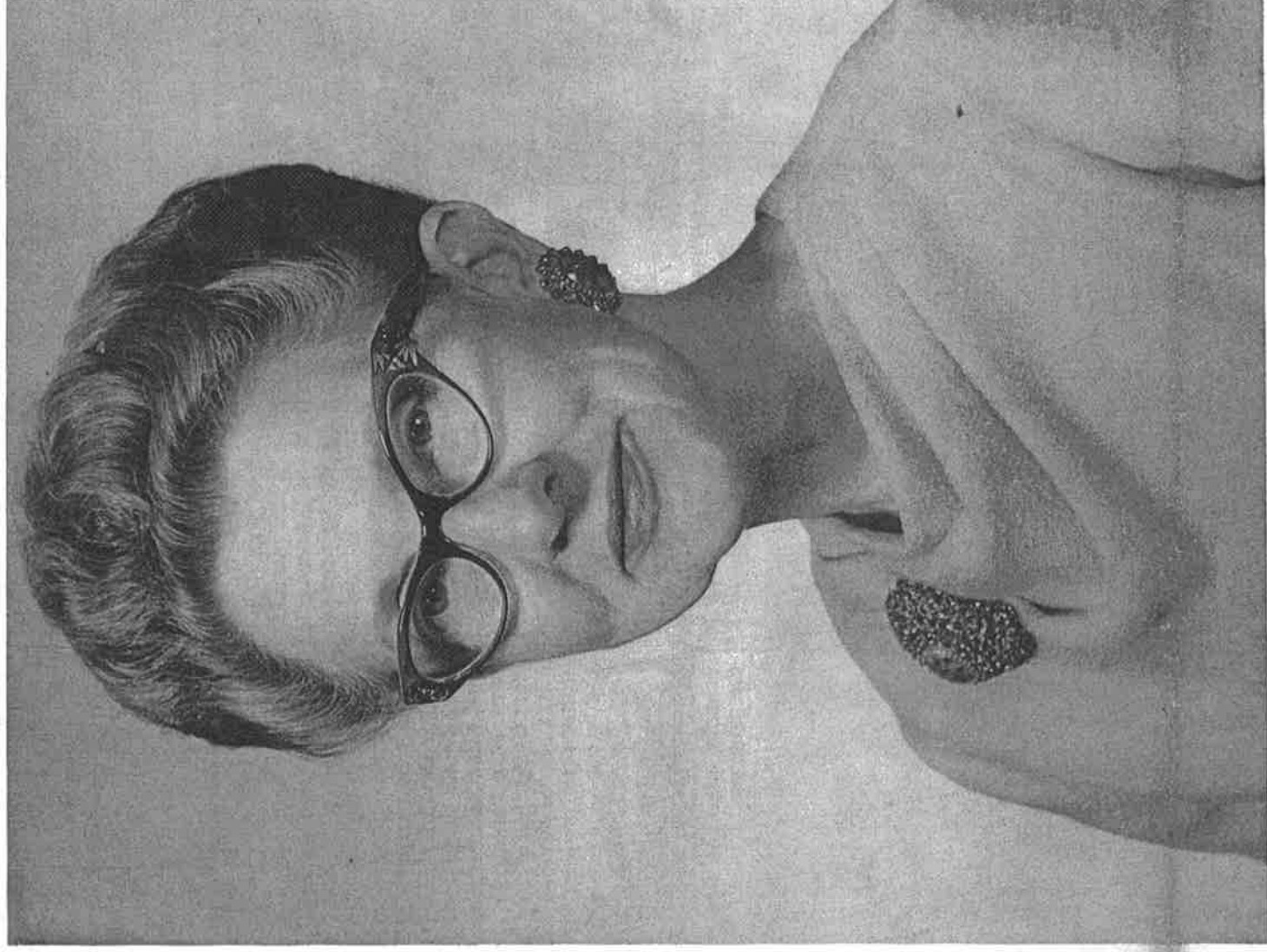

- 1957 - Fairview becomes a four year high school again.
- 1958 - Advanced and Enriched Summer School begins.
- 1959 - Theresa G. Folger becomes the supervisor of the area College Board examinations.
- 1962 - Theresa G. Folger become Principal of Fairview High School.
- 1966 - Program of independent study inaugurated.
- 1967 - Third addition to Fairview begun. Theresa G. Folger retires from the principalship of Fairview High School.

Miss Theresa G. Folger, retiring principal of Fairview High School, was honored with a banquet Tuesday, 6:30, May 16, at Wampler's Silver Arena, sponsored by the Fairview Booster's Club, Fairview PTA, Fairview faculty, and Fairview Alumni. Deadline for reservations was May 10. Approximately 600 attended the dinner. Special guests were Miss Folger's sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Gray.

The General co-chairmen of the event were Mrs. Evelyn Rinehart and Mr. Lloyd Stooksberry. The program co-chairmen were Miss Dorothy Herbst and Mrs. Louise Ferguson. Miss Herbst was toastmistress of the evening.

Fairview's chamber and concert choirs provided entertainment under the direction of Mr. Morris Kurtz. Other entertainment was a combo provided by Mr. Robert Griep.

The following letter was submitted to the Dayton Daily News by Miss Florence Nielson nominating Miss Folger one of the Top Ten Women. Fairview had always known Miss Folger was "tops," and the Daily News agreed, honoring Miss Theresa G. Folger as one of the Top Ten Women in the Dayton area.

Dear Madam,

Not because -

she is the only woman high school principal in Montgomery County and one of a very few in the United States:

nor because -

she is an active member of Altrusa, a service club of business and professional women leaders, and of Delta Kappa Gamma, an honorary society for women educators.

nor especially because -

for 46 years she has been almost a mother-at-school to thousands of Fairview high school students. As teacher, assistant principal, and principal, she has taken personal interest, not only in their scholastic achievements, but also in their individual problems to such an extent that they feel free to call upon her for help at any time of day or night - and many of them do.

Smartly dressed from her upswept hairdo to her 4-inch heels, this 95-pound dynamo can be found at her desk by seven o'clock every school day and seldom does she leave the building before five in the afternoon. But her day is not yet done. At least twice a week she keeps evening office hours for the convenience of working parents who wish to consult her about their common problems.

At Fairview football and basketball games she can be seen in the bleachers, cheering, and at every other school function, she is the first to arrive and the last to leave.

On Saturdays she frequently administers College Board and other examinations, and during her vacation she heads up the Advanced and Enriched Summer School, held in the Fairview building each year. In her "spare" time she often serves as a social worker, either with adoptive babies in the Children's Bureau or with teen-agers at Shawen Acres.

She shares the joys and sorrows of hundreds of former students, attending their weddings and the christening of their children, and when illness, death, or other tragedy overtakes them, she is one of the first to arrive at the home or hospital with words of comfort or advice, or with more tangible evidence of her concern.

In short, because -

for more than two score years she has dedicated her life to other women's children, I nominate Theresa G. Folger as one of the Top Ten Women of the Miami Valley.

the Community was Lowell Murr, Jerry Blumenthal made the presentation for B'nai B'rith. Don Wheeler spoke for the Fairview Alumni Association while the Fairview PTA was represented by James Manion. The Fairview Booster's Club was spoken for by Alan Gabbard.

Next came the presentation of a gold pin with Miss Folger's initials and three diamonds (one representing a period after each initial) by Roy Mayberry who represented the Fairview Faculty. The final tribute, made by Don D. Longnecker, former Fairview principal, was the presentation of Miss Folger's retirement gift, a real "going away" gift, a trip to Greece and the Balkans. Miss Folger was also given a lovely bouquet of forty-six yellow roses, one representing each active year at FHS.

Barry Frank, director of sports programming for the American Broadcasting Company remembers:

"Miss Folger, Assistant Principal during my years at Fairview, had a profound effect on everyone with whom she came in contact. Her dedication to the educational process, and particularly to the proposition that a college education was of primary importance, was undoubtedly a major factor in the remarkable number of Fairview graduates who pursued a higher education. In addition, she was one of the few secondary school administrators of her time who fully appreciated the value of the Fine Arts to a fully rounded education."

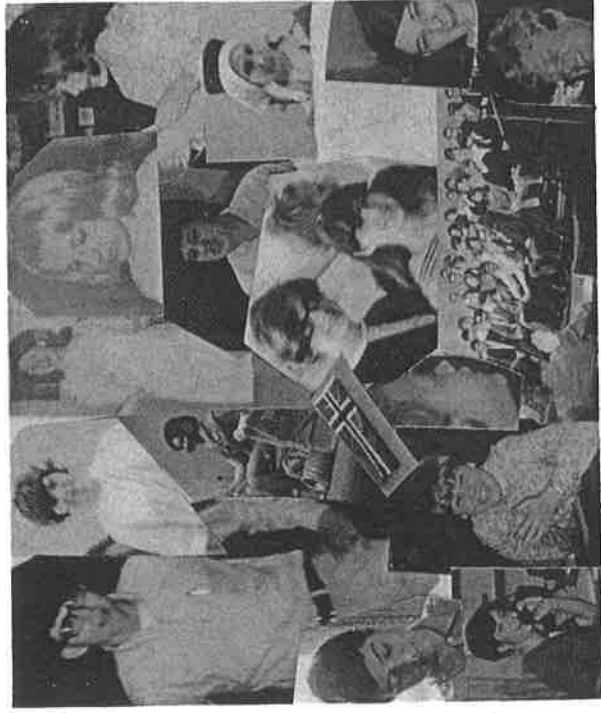

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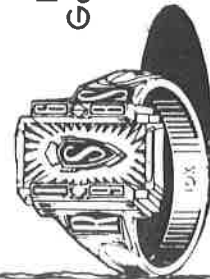
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
